A fantastic family day thoroughly enjoyed by everyone who attended.




Message from your Northumberland County Councillors

County Councillor Russ Wallace

I was both honoured and delighted to be elected to Northumberland County Council as the Independent Councillor for the Bedlington Central ward in the Local Elections on 4 May.

My thanks to those who voted for me and I repeat my pledge to put Bedlington First in my plans, decisions and actions as a Councillor and to do all I can to keep residents informed as to what is happening in their town. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank my predecessor, Cllr Alyson Wallace - namesake but no relation - for her hard work and all that she achieved during her time as County Councillor for Bedlington Central.

- a better range and improved choice of retail services

- investment in our road structure to make it safer and less congested
- improved town centre parking.

I can make no promises to bring these issues to a satisfactory conclusion. I can however promise to work tirelessly and do all I possibly can to improve Bedlington as a place to live - although having said that I would not want to live anywhere else!

Remembrance

As Remembrance time approaches it is pertinent to think, once again, about the human cost of the wars which were fought to maintain freedom in our country.

The town of Bedlington has always responded generously to our nation's call, as the 223 names on the war memorial attests. However, it is important to remember that not all war casualties were soldiers - or, indeed, men. A good example of this would be 2111620 LACW Minnie Nicholson, a young Bedlington lass who was a member of the Women's Auxiliary Air Force.

In April 1945, almost the end of the Second World War, Minnie was serving at RAF Aston Down in Gloucestershire. This was the home of No. 55 Operational Training Unit which trained aircrew for combat flying.

On 25th March 1945 a Hawker Typhoon aircraft piloted by Warrant

Officer R Thompson attempted to make a forced landing at Aston Down but it crashed into a dispersal hut where Minnie was on duty and burst into flames, setting the hut alight as its fuel tanks ruptured and burned. The pilot and two ground crew were killed instantly and 18 other personnel injured.

Minnie suffered serious burns and was taken initially to RAF Innsworth from where a Dakota aircraft flew her to the RAF Hospital at Cosford, near Wolverhampton. Minnie's injuries were severe and despite the efforts of the doctors she died on 7th April 1945. She was just 21 years old.

Minnie's body was brought home to Bedlington and she was buried in Netherton Lane Cemetery. Her grave, marked with a Commonwealth War Graves headstone, can be found not far from the main entrance and her name is engraved on the Bedlington Town War Memorial.

Like thousands of others, men and women, Minnie gave her life in the

service of our country. She and all the other casualties of war deserve to be remembered with honour and respect. Lest we forget.

Bedlington War Memorial

Completed in early October 2017, The Town Council has commissioned a new accessible pathway and seating area at the War Memorial on Front Street Bedlington which we hope will be enjoyed by all.

We hope the pathway designed and constructed by local firm W L Straughan & Son Ltd will enhance the existing Memorial with the provision of additional seating and some enhanced year round planting. Set back behind the War Memorial, away from the road the area should provide a quieter more tranquil place for reflection and contemplation.

The seats are World War One memorial benches and they have been specifically designed to be the mirror image of one another.

The project was made possible by financial contributions from our Northumberland County Councillors Members' Improvement scheme funding and West Bedlington Town Council wishes to publically thank County Councillors Bill Crosby, Jeff Gobin, Malcolm Robinson and Russ Wallace for their very kind and generous contributions.

Salvation Army Summer Club

The Salvation Army in Bedlington work with the local community from new-born babies to people approaching their centenary year. Our weekday programme is non-stop, from Parent and Toddlers on a Monday morning to DV8 youth club or Messy Church on a Friday evening.

Many of our sessions work on a membership basis, but some of the programme such as Seated Aerobics, Games Club or The Soup Spot are open to anyone to drop in and join in. An average (I won't say normal!) week covers three Parent and Toddler groups, Home League, Bible Study group, Lunch Club, Over 60s, Seated Aerobics, Games Club, CAMEO, The Soup Spot and either DV8 Youth Club or Messy Church. In between our programme Slimming World have two sessions, Mind Active deliver their Activity Day using our catering kitchen and Guidepost Artists group meet together to paint and draw.

Wherever we do have to charge for activities the cost is kept to a minimum

in order to keep the programme running, but no profit is made.

During the first two weeks of the schools' summer break we offered Summer Club for children over 6 years old. Both weeks were fully subscribed with our maximum of 30 children each day. We all had great fun playing indoor and outdoor games, doing craft activities, hearing stories and singing songs. Each day finished off with lunch for all the children before they were collected. Fish fingers, sausages, burgers, bolognese, sandwiches and ice cream were all consumed in record quantities.

We are very grateful to West Bedlington Town Council who gave us a Community Chest Grant of £500 to cover the shortfall between the minimal charge we make for each child and the outlay to cover two weeks food, crafts and activities. As always, we tried to spend it wisely on games and equipment that are sustainable and will be used for many summers to come.

COMMUNITY CHEST GRANTS



West Bedlington Town Council has a 'Community Chest' scheme which gives local voluntary groups and organisations a chance to bid for funding.

This might be to help establish a new group or to carry out extra activities that they wouldn't otherwise be able to do - e.g. sporting activities, arts, music or craft group, new equipment for a youth club - but these ideas will be coming from the community themselves.

To qualify for an award the applicant must be able to demonstrate clearly that any funding from West Bedlington Town Council will benefit the Town, or residents of the Town.

Grant applications will be dealt with by the Full Council. In determining the validity of an application, the Council will refer to the following guidelines:

Applications will be considered for the following purposes:

1. For the purpose of purchasing equipment or materials either in part or in full.
2. For the purchase of services e.g. venue hire or transport that will enable group members to partake in a group trip or outing regardless of their incomes.
3. For running costs (but not wages) of a viable group that is experiencing a period of hardship.
4. For the provision of recreational activities and facilities.
5. For activities that raise the profile of the area.

There is £5,000 available for community grants in the current financial year.

A story from one of our beneficiaries Northumberland Community Enterprise at Bedlington Community Allotment

West Bedlington Town Council awarded Northumberland Community Enterprise £500 to provide a range of gardening associated activities at its Bedlington Community Allotment.

The Community Allotment is situated at Plot 13 within the Doctor Pit Allotments Bedlington (access from Park Road or Hassop Way). Drop in sessions "free and open to all" are on Mondays and Wednesdays between 10am and 12 noon where you can join in



the gardening activities or simply observe and enjoy the tranquil environment of the allotment.

The allotment plot has 13 raised beds which can be accessed by

all, including wheelchair users and volunteers are always on hand to provide knowledgeable advice, guidance and encouragement.

Regular plant and produce sales take place - you are sure to pick up a bargain.

Ashington Blyth and Tyne Railway Association (ABTRA)

Ashington, Blyth and Tyne Railway Association (ABTRA) was formed in July 2016 to help preserve and promote the history around the Ashington Blyth and Tyne railway line including but not limited to colliery systems, waggon ways and the Bedlington Iron & Loco works.

Whilst the group is in its infancy we have had some positive meetings including one with Network Rail where we discussed a good deal more than just weed clearance and rubbish removal at the disused Bedlington Station and its associated buildings.

In addition the group has also held meetings with Harworth Estates regarding the unused rail link at Ashington (known locally as the Butterwell branch).

Discussions with Northumberland County Council with regard to pit tub memorials with a view to the group repairing the tubs and enhancing the areas in which they stand.

However as mentioned we are still a small group and in order for us to move forward we require more members and funds to carry out our proposals.

The group have also discussed the possibility of opening a small museum in Bedlington, to promote the history of the area such as Sir Daniel Gooch who identified the site of the Swindon works, and who was actually born and grew up in

what is now The Grapes Public House on Bedlington Front Street.



What's been going on at The Council?

Well the biggest changes were made in May following the elections, there were changes in administrations at both County and Town level.

Well the biggest changes were made in May following the elections, there were changes in administrations at both County and Town level. Three out of four Bedlington County Councillors were exchanged, Labour for Independents, with Terry Johnstone being replaced by Malcolm Robinson, Russ Wallace superseded Alyson Wallace (no relation) and finally Bill Crosby took up the reigns in place of Val Tyler. I would like to acknowledge the contributions made by the outgoing Councillors and congratulate the new incumbents. We are looking forward to working with you all over the next four years, and to start the ball rolling, I issued an invitation to the new County Councillors to attend and provide updates for residents at the West Bedlington Town Council full council meetings. To date they have attended all meetings and provided full round ups of their activities as well as what's going on in the county, giving

residents a better insight into activities. So if you want to know more of what's going on get yourself along to West Bedlington Town Council meetings. They are held on the second Thursday of every month starting at 18.30, everyone is welcome.

At Town Council level, we also had a change in administration with new faces joining the Town Council and I've outlined these changes in my foreword.

Following the changes in the County Administration, I was pleased to hear about the devolvement of decision making to Local Area Committees. However further announcements revealed that we would be coupled with Cramlington and Seaton Valley. Whatever your opinion I feel that localised decision making has to be better in the longer run as local knowledge and expertise inevitable, leads to more sound solutions for local



issues. To date most of these meeting have taken place in Cramlington with just the last one being held in Bedlington, however there are plans to host these more evenly across the area and there will be another one soon in Bedlington's Netherton Club.

Over the last two years West Bedlington Town Council have focused on renewing our assets and we have invested heavily in bus shelters and playground equipment. Those now out of the way we have shifted our efforts and are looking at maintenance for these assets. We previously budgeted for an operative and to push forward with this we have set up a working group to look at what we hope to gain from having a handyman and the associated costs to fund him/her/ them. This working group is being led by Councillor Kathleen Roach who is reporting to full council with her findings, hopefully this work will progress quickly and we will have a plan outlined in the very near future.

Work is continuing to enhance the Christmas lighting and we will have Christmas lights all up Front Street, down Glebe Bank and along Schalksmuhle Road, re-joining Front Street at the Northumberland Arms junction. I think this will give us a fantastic display of lights which will enhance the Christmas feeling for everyone to enjoy. Of course the focus will still be the Christmas tree in the Market Square. I'm hoping our investment in the Christmas





decorations will remain vandal free and would appeal if anyone sees or hears about any vandalism in our town please contact the police immediately or ring the Council office on 01670 457070.

As a council we have successfully delivered a number of events during the summer period. The Picnic, see the full write up from Councillor Victoria Thompson, was a fantastic event for all the family. Also I was asked to organise and run my first ever dog show. Thankfully I didn't do this single handedly and I put in a call to Peter Arris of the Bedlington Terrier North East Group, what a fantastic bunch of people, they turned up in their droves to support and assist with the event which was really well supported by residents. I didn't sit down all day and called in favours from my friends, Mrs Doreen Richardson who judged the dog the judge would most like to take home, had difficulty selecting a winner. I think she wanted to take them all home!!

August saw the street Carnival, a fun fair, Disney Princesses, a fabulous compare, live music from a jazz band and a headline Little Mix tribute act. This along with a Scarecrow competition provided something for everyone. Special thanks should go to Charmaine Hamilton who organised the event and Councillor David Graham who ensured it all ran smoothly on the day.

Bedlington Town Council was pleased to offer financial support to the Bedlington Northumberland Live event. I attended on the day with my family and we all had a great day out. I understand that plans are going on to provide another event next year.

Looking forward we have two events in the pipeline, the first one for Halloween on Tuesday the 31st October.
