Foreword from Christine Taylor Mayor, West Bedlington Town Council

Welcome to our second newsletter of the year, I can't believe how quickly this year has gone.

I would like to use my little spot in the publication to highlight some activities and achievements undertaken by the Council over the last six months. To start with we finally have CCTV in the town, working with Northumbria Police we have identified specific areas of concerns as well as providing coverage for Town Council property. I know the police have already found this a useful addition to aid policing within the town.

We hope to secure planning permission for our new play area on 20 Acres, this area will be for under 12's and a small football pitch with goal posts. County Councillor Russ Wallace has very generously made a donation from his Small Scheme Fund to support this venture. We have also looked at the road safety aspects of the location of the park and Northumberland County Council have agreed to provide a chicane to slow traffic down. We felt the need to provide the play area following several requests from local residents for facilities for their children. We are

aware that this is a dog walking area so we will be fencing the play area to ensure it remains clean and free from dog fouling.

We have also recently installed speed awareness signs; two in Nedderton Village and two beside Hartford Home Farm. This has been achieved working with County Councillor Malcolm Robinson who very generously made a donation from his Small Scheme Fund. We also have to thank Isabel Esson who donated over several hundred pounds from her fund raising activities, Isabel works tirelessly raising funds to support road safety following the unnecessary death of her daughter Beth Fisher two years ago.

I have been following concerns raised regarding Westlea Cemetery. While this isn't the responsibility of West Bedlington Town Council I have visited the cemetery and have seen there are a number of issues, so I asked for and have a number of volunteers who are taking up the mantle by forming a "Friends of Westlea Cemetery Group". If you are interested in joining this group please get in touch.

We are continuing to work with our schools to put their art work in our bus shelters, this will continue during this

year so watch out for changes in the bus shelters coming soon. This project started in the hope of giving children some ownership of our Town Council property and I can report that we have seen some reduction in the damage.

As we move towards the year end we have two events left, 2nd November is our Spooktacular which is a Halloween/ Fireworks event with fancy dress and disco followed by fireworks. Tickets will be priced at £1.00 to prevent people picking up more tickets than they actually need and allow everyone the opportunity to attend. Our final event is the Christmas Light Switch-On, on the 30th November, in the Market Square. We will have a traditional switch on with an ice rink, traditional stalls and Christmas fayre.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has worked with us during this year. We are truly grateful for your continued support. As this is our last publication prior to the festive period I would like to wish you all a Merry Christmas and very best wishes for 2020.

A Sun Dial for Bedlington

Regular readers of this newsletter will be aware of The Councils plans to install a public sun dial in Bedlington Market Place.


Delays initially with obtaining planning permission, suppliers and a requirement to change the location have resulted in the project running much longer than at first anticipated. Let's hope the sun is still shining by the time the sun dial is actually installed.

In anticipation of a successful completion we wanted to remind residents of the design of this unique sun dial which will be located in Bedlington Market Place. This is to be the final project of local resident Tony Moss of Lindisfarne Sun Dials who has been designing sun dials for more years than he cares to remember. Tony had decided that his final sun dial will be here in Bedlington.

You may have seen some of Tony's work right here in the North East as he designed the 20 meter diameter dial on the hill at Silverlink.

We asked Tony about the current project and his love for sundials.

"My first encounters with sundials as a small boy left me wondering where they were wound up and why nothing seemed to move. Seventy years later and after indulging my paying hobby, designing and making sundials while trading as 'Lindisfarne Sundials' I leave instruments both very large and very small from Vancouver Island in the far west of Canada to Hong Kong in the other direction. Amongst forty+ instruments in the USA, is my very special dial to celebrate the founding of the first English colony at Jamestown. After seven sundialling visits to the USA and Canada and even one to design, make and install the most northerly sundial on Earth, on the island of Spitsbergen (the Norwegians call it Svalbard) it is now time to design something for my home town of 50+ years. My own preference was for a very rugged design that would withstand rough weather, time and New Year 'celebrations' and the like.



Early consultations however, resulted in an elegant design incorporating several iconic images from early locomotives to the Trotter Memorial and the Market Cross or 'Nail'. Unfortunately, by the time various permissions were obtained, the company which has carried out the hazardous deep etching of several stainless steel plates for me in the past no longer offered this service. A new design, speaks strongly of Bedlington, its roots in coal mining and the local metalworking tradition which has wrought it to my designs. Our famous terrier is the proud supporter of the shadow-casting 'gnomon' - an ancient word arising from early Greek and meaning something like 'the wise one'. All is placed on a hexagonal mounting based on pit winding gear. The dial

plate is surrounded by a contrate (crown-like) gearwheel: hopefully a deterrent to would-be climbers and edge-sitters.

Basic sundials are really very simple things to understand. Stick a pencil in the snow at the North Pole pointing directly upwards at the Pole Star and its shadow from the Sun will move in 24 equal steps (15°) each day/night so there are your 24 hours. Move down to Bedlington and Polaris is no longer overhead so the gnomon has to be sloped to align with that pencil at the pole. The hour and minute lines are no longer equally spaced.

The Reading Plate nearby will give more information to allow users to convert sundial time (local Solar Time) to clock time."

Salvation Army Summer Club

Summer Club this year was later than usual and we think the change worked well.

In previous years we always offered the first week of the six-week summer break, but this year we broke with tradition and activities took place in the last week of the six. This was intended to give the children something to look forward to at the point in the holidays they're usually bored as well as give the parents a week of respite from entertaining and coughing up cash.

The week was a full programme of games, crafts, cooking, songs and bible teaching. The week for children over 6 and under 12 years old was fully subscribed with our maximum of 40 children each day. Each day finished off with lunch for all the children before they were collected. Fish fingers, sausages, burgers, bolognaise and a buffet over the five days with ice cream each day covered in enough raspberry sauce to fill a lake. Half way through each morning the children all stopped for a snack and a drink. We are very

grateful to Morrisons who supplied crisps, chocolate biscuits, bananas, apples and squash for the whole week.

The finale to the week was presentation to the parents by the children on Saturday morning and we all ate our buffet lunch together.

We are very grateful to West Bedlington Town Council who gave us a grant of £500 to cover the shortfall between the minimal charge we make for each child and the outlay to cover the weeks food, crafts and activities. As always, we tried to spend it wisely on games and equipment that are sustainable and will be used for many events and summers to come.

Many of the items we bought will go on to be used in our DV8 Youth Club which is every other Friday from 6pm until 7.30pm for 6 to 12-year olds (please call for places (£1 per child) or as part of Messy Church which takes place on the last Friday of each month. Messy Church is a family evening which starts at 6pm with crafts, bible stories and songs and ends with

everyone sharing a meal. There is no charge for Messy Church, please feel free to come and join us as a family. Family Film Club on the 'vacant' Friday evening at 5.30pm. All families are welcome to join us. Entry is free; all we ask is that you buy hotdogs, popcorn, chocolate and drinks from our tuck shop and don't come armed with your own goodies. All tuck shop items are only 50p each. Again, we are grateful to West Bedlington Town Council who last year paid to have our cinema equipment updated and for the purchase of the first six films to get the ball rolling. Please check our Facebook page for details of films and other events.

Wherever we do have to charge for activities the cost is kept to a minimum in order to keep the programme running, but no profit is made.

Carers come in all shapes and sizes, it could be a wife caring for her husband; a husband caring for his wife; parents caring for an adult child with physical and /or mental illness; adult children caring for one or both parents; grandparents or other older relatives; adult siblings caring for one another following the death of their parents and as we see more and more, older couples mutually caring for each other with often complex physical and mental conditions.

A carer can be someone who looks in on an elderly neighbour once a day, or someone who is carrying out intensive 24 hour a day support. Caring can be short term, where a person being cared for is recovering from an illness or injury, sporadic, where the effects of a condition can change the level of caring and support required such as an ongoing mental illness or long term - this could be caring for someone with a life limiting condition or a condition which becomes progressively worse over time.

Carers Northumberland is a charity dedicated to improving the lives of carers by responding to the needs of carers, informing carers of their rights and entitlements, supporting carers to access help for the person they care for, reducing

the social isolation that so many carers feel and empowering carers to have a voice.

Flying the flag

West Bedlington Town Council recognises that flags are emotive symbols which can boost local and national identities and strengthen community cohesion. They are a way for communities to express feelings of joy, pride and loyalty.

Like all symbols, flags are open to wide-ranging interpretation and, therefore, also have the potential to cause controversy and create tension between community groups whose opinions may differ. The flying of any flag must be viewed in the context in which it is flown or displayed. Factors affecting

the context include the manner, location and frequency with which flags are flown.

The Council has a responsibility to carefully consider the potential impact upon its communities of flying flags from its properties and how that action may be interpreted.

The Council recently installed a flag pole at The War Memorial, Front Street West and has agreed a policy with regard to which flags and the dates those flags are to flown. Details are shown below:



Flag Trivia

The Flag Protocol of the United Kingdom

The national flags of the United Kingdom (ie. the Union Flag and the flags of England, Scotland and Wales) should be displayed only in a dignified manner befitting the national emblems. They should not be displayed in a position inferior to any other flag or ensign.

It is improper to use the national flags as a table or seat cover or as a masking for boxes, barriers, or the intervening space between a dais or platform and the floor. The use of any of the national flags to cover a statue, monument or plaque for an unveiling ceremony is discouraged.

Flying the Flag


Flags may be flown on every day of the year. Government and local authority buildings in England, Scotland and Wales are encouraged to fly national flags every day of the year (the flying of flags at certain locations in Northern Ireland is constrained by The Flags Regulations [Northern Ireland] 2000 and Police Emblems and Flag Regulations [Northern Ireland] 2002).[2]

Flags are normally flown from sunrise to sunset but they may also be flown at night, when they should be illuminated.

No permission is needed to fly the national flags and they are excluded from most planning and advertising regulations (but flagpoles may not be).

National flags should never be flown in a worn or damaged condition, or when soiled. To do so is to show disrespect for the nations they represent.

Important: the Union Flag has a correct way up - in the half of the flag nearest the flagpole, the wider diagonal white stripe must be above the red diagonal stripe, as Scotland's St Andrew's Cross takes precedence over Ireland's St. Patrick's Cross. It is most improper to fly the flag upside down.

The Council would like to express its sincere and grateful thanks to Isabel for her most generous and benevolent donation of £767 in making this invaluable contribution to help improve road safety in the town.

Thanks also to Northumberland County Council Malcolm Robinson who contributed the majority of the cost of the project from his County Councillor Small Schemes Fund.

Defibrillator Guardians help save lives?

Through this newsletter The Council has tried on a number of occasions to reach out to the community for volunteers to become "Defibrillator Guardians".

The Council along with Bedlington Masonics and Beadling Manor have provided three Community Debribrillators in the town. These potentially lifesaving pieces of equipment require a regular health check of their own to ensure they are working as they should be.

A guardian is a loyal, responsible person who volunteers to carry out a regular cabinet and defibrillator inspection. A simple questionnaire is completed and returned to the Ambulance Service via the Town Council office and this confirms to the Ambulance Service whether or not a defibrillator is operational.

Without the support of loyal guardians, many Public Access Defibrillators sites and initiatives would not be possible to operate. We would very much like to ensure this service continues and possibly extended in the future to provide a wider network of defibrillators. However do need the support of volunteers from the community to assist with the regular checks.

We are delighted to announce that local residents Lucie Archbold and April Orr have very kindly volunteered to act as guardians to our public access defibrillators. The Council would like to thank both Lucie and April for fulfilling this very important role, it is very much appreciated by both The Council and the community as a whole.

We are still on the lookout for more volunteers, so if you wish to help in your community as a guardian and help ensure this valuable piece of emergency equipment is available at all times please contact The Town Clerk (contact details at the end of this newsletter).

Watch Your Speed - Our Volunteers Are - Community Speed Watch in Northumberland

Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a national initiative where active members of local communities join with the support of the Police to monitor speeds of vehicles using calibrated speed detection devices.

Vehicles exceeding the speed limit are reported to the Police and a warning letter is issued with the aim of educating drivers to reduce their speeds. In cases where education is blatantly ignored and evidence of repeat or excessive offences is collated (even across county borders), enforcement and prosecution follow.

CSW Volunteers are employed and vetted by the Police and are working on behalf of the Police and communities to organise and coordinate CSW activity. Speeding is not just a local phenomenon - neither is Speedwatch.

Speeding continues to be a concern

for many communities in both rural and urban environments. Therefore, Community Speedwatch is not restricted to villages and rural towns. Neighbourhood Policing Panels have an important role to play in developing safer urban communities and the adoption of Speedwatch schemes.

Volunteers receive appropriate training, and are supported by their neighbourhood policing team (NPT) staff with an aim to:

- Reduce death and injury on the roads
- Improve the quality of life for local communities
- Reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
- Increase public awareness of inappropriate speed

Community Speed Watch is a

proactive solution to improve the safety and quality of life for everyone in the community.

In conjunction with Choppington Parish Council, West Bedlington Town Council has been able to provide funding to help support the Community Speed Watch volunteers operating in the joint parish areas.

The Council would like to thank the Community Speed Watch volunteers for their continued commitment to road safety in the parish, their efforts are very much appreciated.

To help strengthen public awareness of road safety issues the Town Council has commissioned local school children to produce road safety themed art work to be displayed in bus shelters around the town. We hope to have the project completed later this year.

A month later, Isabel (Issie), presented a petition to the Local Area Council to have speed cameras installed on Rothesay Terrace. It was a privilege for me to help Issie in this venture. Eventually, two speed indicator signs (SID) were installed on that stretch of road.

Since that day, Issie has campaigned tirelessly to get more speed signs erected in Bedlington. To help raise funds for these projects, she has organised two Tea dances at Meadowdale Academy. As a result of the first event in 2018 she was able to contribute to the SID sign that is now evident on Stead Lane and this year following a similar event she has donated funds to West Bedlington Town Council for speed awareness projects in their area.

Issie should be commended for the time and effort she puts into organising these events to make Bedlington a safer place for us all to enjoy.

Bedlington Community Brass Band

Blow your own horn!

Brass bands have been and remain a huge part of community life in our area from the time when the landscape was dotted with coal mines.

You can follow the history at Woodhorn Museum, with its amazing display of miners' banners, and Durham Miners' Gala fills the streets of the city each year with brilliant bands; but Bedlington hasn't had its own band for many years ... that is, until five years ago.

Music Partnership North, the music development organisation for young people in our region, gained funding from Youth Music to start a big brass playing project in Bedlington's schools. Whole classes were able to try out and learn brass instruments, with schools forming 'minibands' and special projects to bring the players together each year at the Miners' Picnic in Ashington.

Brilliant! But what happens when the children get really hooked? What happens when they want more, but they're not good enough to join one of the local competition bands? That's where, for us adults, the genius of the project kicks in. A key part of it was to begin a Community Brass Band in Bedlington, and five years ago Bedlington Community Brass Band was formed. It's a Brass Band, but not as we used to know them, because absolutely anyone can join. And they do. Chris has played brass instruments all his life, but his wife hadn't - he dragged her along three days after she'd first blown into a trombone to see what would happen - she was made welcome and is still blowing! Band members include children who've been part of the Schools' Brass Project, parents who've been inspired by their children, people who used to play long, long ago and fancied picking it up again and players new to brass and even new to music. Members comment that one of the best things about the band is the friendliness, the people, and the fact that all generations come together in it. Sometimes the grown-ups wish the young ones were a bit less chatty, and sometimes the young ones wish break times at band practice were longer, but everyone agrees that getting along together and making music together is fantastic.

With professional support from our tutors and lots of help and encouragement from band members old and young, new members are really made welcome and have fun. The great thing about a band is that if you make a mistake, no one minds, and there are usually plenty of other players to cover it up!

So far it's been an exciting ride. We've made friends with other bands and performed with them in churches and community venues; we've helped out at fundraisers and community events. A big highlight has been playing each year at the Miners' Picnic alongside competition bands and the minibands, in sunshine and in rain (remember those ponchos, everyone?). We've played music specially written for us. We've played with international star brass ensembles



and we've even played Hall One at the Sage. We play all kinds of music from traditional hymns and marches to pop music and movie tunes, and all the band members have noticed how much we've improved over the years - but we still welcome all newcomers, whatever their playing level!

From the beginning, the band has been funded through amazing support from MPN, who have raised funds from Youth Music. But we always knew this could not go on for ever. So band members formed a Trust to look after the community band part of the project and to give us the chance to build a band for the long-term future. We still have very close links with MPN; our conductor and tutor are MPN people and MPN sends members from minibands and the 'trainer band' to us when they are ready; but we have also been able to secure support from local businesses and West Bedlington Town Council to help with band expenses: room hire, tutors, music, instruments, insurance and our ('very cool', according to band members) uniforms. Without that kind of support, we couldn't survive and we couldn't remain open to all.

For the future, our band wants to play the best part we can in our local community. We love to be involved in local events and with local life; we've recently been invited into a care home and we are excited to see what memories and enjoyment we will spark with the residents. Music is woven into our lives in so many ways, and the more we do, the more fun life is!

So for our future we need two things: we need supporters who can help fund the band or join our lovely committee who do the behind the scenes work to run the band; and we need players. We are really keen to grow the band and to welcome anyone who used to play or who fancies having a go. We can provide instruments and help with learning, and the band subs are low because we want to be accessible to all. We rehearse on Tuesdays in termtime (but not every single week - check our facebook page for details) from 7-8.30 at Bedlington Community Centre. If you think that might be you, find us on facebook (Bedlington Brass Family) and leave a message, or come along and see us - and give us a try. We need you!

Many thanks to them, especially the Mayor Chris Taylor and again I think its testament to what can be done working together for resident's benefit. This is just a first stage in an attempt to make our roads safer for us all.

It took 2 years to get the footpath renewed from the Town up to Hartford Bridge and both Councillor Russ Wallace and myself have relayed our disappointment with NCC about the current state. We have been assured this will be sorted out but I still wonder if fertilizer instead of weed killer was used before any work was done!

Can't not mention our Town Centre development and again we have been at the forefront of efforts to get this back on track. I expect we will all see how that is to progress very shortly.

Talking of track the much anticipated reopened new line to Newcastle with a station in Bedlington is progressing, with NCC and the new combined North of Tyne Authority providing the seed funding and the government still looking favourably at the project.

WEST BEDLINGTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN - UPDATE

As you may have read in the last issue of the West Bedlington Town Council newsletter, we have started the process of drawing up a Neighbourhood plan.

Thanks to all those who responded to our questionnaire in the last issue.

So where are we with the Neighbourhood Plan since the last update?

We have drawn up a number of DRAFT policies for our core values of the neighbourhood plan which are:

- Housing.
- Town Centre/Local Economy.
- Heritage.
- Environment.
- Community Well-being.
- Transport and infrastructure.

At the moment we have to work on two things which are called a habitats

regulations assessment (HRA) and strategic environmental assessment (SEA).

These are required due to the fact we want to cover areas which could effect development and the growth of the town.

While work is ongoing on the HRA and SEA we have worked on a policy regarding Local Green Space and Protected open Space.

So what is the difference between Local Green Space and Protected open space?

- Local green space (LGS) designation is a way to protect green areas or open spaces against development where they are of particular importance to local communities. LGS designations are made for use in local plans or neighbourhood plans. These plans can identify on a map ('designate') green areas for special protection. Once designated, LGSs receive protection consistent with national Green Belt policy.



- Protected open space (POS) designation is a way to protect other areas of open space which are valued for their local amenity and for informal or formal recreational purposes, but which do not meet the full LGS criteria. Once designated, they should be safeguarded and only lost where a number of detailed criteria are met.

We have enclosed maps highlighting the areas we believe should be designated as Local Green space or Protected open space.

We would like to seek your views on whether you agree with the sites and their allocation as either Local green space or protected open space and if there are any other sites which should be included within this document.

CCTV in Bedlington

The eagle eye amongst you will have spotted the new CCTV cameras around the town.

At long last, we hear some of you say. Regrettably the project has been plagued by a series of infra structure supplier delays but these have been resolved and the system is now fully operational.

The Town Council has procured the services of Reay Security Ltd to provide an inclusive CCTV service for the supply, installation, and ongoing maintenance of the system.

Nine individual monitoring stations, each with two cameras have been located in prominent locations around the town to help reinforce crime prevention and public safety. Some of the chosen locations assist The Town Council to protect some of its public assets at The War Memorial and Meadowdale and Westlea Play areas but other locations have been selected in conjunction with Northumbria Police to provide the best coverage of existing problem areas.

Images from the cameras are not seen or recorded by The Town Council and The Council do not have access to the system. Any instances of crime or anti-social behaviour must on every occasion be first reported to Northumbria Police, who will determine how best to use any available images obtained from the system.

Play Area 20 Acre Field

At the time of going to print the planning application for the creation of a new children's play area at 20 Acre playing field is out to public consultation.

Providing the appropriate planning permission is obtained The Town Council intends to install the play equipment and fencing at the contractors earliest convenience.

The funding for the provision and installation of the play equipment is met by ring fenced funding from the building developers fund (section 106).

An "illustration" of what the proposed new play area and a proposed site layout for both the play area and the adjoining mini football pitch are shown on this page. The equipment is specifically tailored for younger children, 12 years and under who would usually be accompanied to the play area by adults.

The entire project will be surrounded by an attractive bow topped fence, with wide access gates for buggies and wheelchairs.

You will read elsewhere in this newsletter about the introduction of CCTV around the town and specifically at the Councils existing play areas. CCTV cameras will also be installed at the new play area as a deterrent against any anti-social behaviour/vandalism.

The CCTV is only for the purpose of crime prevention and public safety.

The wider project, should the planning application be successful also includes the provision of a road traffic speed calming scheme. The Highways department of Northumberland County Council have already prepared an initial scheme which includes the use of "slow children playing signs" together with physical alterations to the road layout including a "chicane" and "pillows" to slow road traffic down and help make road crossings onto the 20 Acre Playing Field at Church Lane safer.



BEDLINGTON VETERANS

On 29th June Armed Forces Day was commemorated in Bedlington for the first time as 17 former service personnel paraded at the war memorial on Front Street.

The proceedings commenced when the Mayor, Councillor Christine Taylor together with County Councillor Bill Crosby, both veterans themselves, gave welcoming speeches and then The Mayor read a very moving poem, which was followed by the raising of the Union Flag on Bedlington's brand new flag pole. The exhortation was given by Sydney Graham (Poppy Appeal Organiser) and Last Post and Reveille was played by Brian Storey of the Salvation Army. The formal ceremony was followed by a social event in Bedlington Community Centre.

COMMUNITY CHEST GRANTS

West Bedlington Town Council has a 'Community Chest' scheme which gives local voluntary groups and organisations a chance to bid for funding.

This might be to help establish a new group or to carry out extra activities that they wouldn't otherwise be able to do - e.g. sporting activities, arts, music or craft group, new equipment for a youth club - but these ideas will be coming from the community themselves.

To qualify for an award the applicant must be able to demonstrate clearly that any funding from West Bedlington Town Council will benefit the Town, or residents of the Town.

Grant applications will be dealt with by the Full Council. In determining the validity of an application, the Council will refer to the following guidelines:



Applications will be considered for the following purposes:

1. For the purpose of purchasing equipment or materials either in part or in full.
2. For the purchase of services e.g. venue hire or transport that will enable group members to partake in a group trip or outing regardless of their incomes.
3. For running costs (but not wages) of a viable group that is experiencing a period of hardship.
4. For the provision of recreational activities and facilities.
5. For activities that raise the profile of the area.
